

Successful Agreements & Partnerships with Tribes

Partnership agreement with the Oklahoma Tribal Conservation Advisory Council (OTCAC) since 2004.

- Held over 5000 workshops, webinars and training to promote access and delivery of NRCS programs and technical assistance.
- Partner to hold 9 Working Effective with American Indian training for 14 Different NRCS states.
- 11 Nation to Nation Consultation Conferences with all 39 Tribes.
- Partner with the Oklahoma Conservation Commission districts and Tribes to sponsor for 430 conservation days for youth.
- Sponsored Tribal conservation days. During COVID, sponsored 19 conservation days and 11 seed giveaway.
- Provided ZOOM to NRCS to hold 64 webinars.





Success Story

In a NRCS partnership agreement with Bureau of Indians Affairs for Tribal Soil Climate Analysis Network units on Tribal Trust Land. Oklahoma received three units. The Cheyenne and Arapaho Tribes, the Cherokee Nation and the Choctaw Nation

- TSCAN was initiated in 2017 to provide improved soil climate data to tribes in underserved locations around the U.S.
- Goals of the project are to provide localized soil and climate data to selected tribes for agricultural and forestry management decisions, strengthen tribal outreach to support production management as well as STEM (Science Technology Engineering and Math) education.
- NRCS partnered with the Choctaw Nation to hold the first TSCAN Workshops for Tribal youth to promote STEM.









Successful Agreements & Partnerships with Tribes

NRSC enter into soil health agreements with four Tribes, Cheyenne and Arapaho Tribe, Cherokee Nation, Choctaw Nation and Quapaw Nation.

The groundbreaking agreements were a start to harness and share the latest in conservation technologies to improve soil health and make their land more resilient.

The Tribes established a demonstration farm on Tribal lands to showcase the effectiveness of soil health practices such as no-till and cover crops to increase land productivity.

The Tribes held 67 workshops and 8 demonstration tours.

Lessons Learned
















- Check and update your Tribal Leader list every 30 days. Do a spreadsheet to track all the Tribal elections
- Verify you know when Tribal elections occur
- Make certain you know the correct title of the Tribal leader
 - Governor, Chief, Chairman, Mekko, Chairwoman
- Importance of a Tribal Liaison Position





Lessons Learned















- Know who the Tribal leader's administrative assistant is
- Always make sure they are cc in emails to the Tribal leader's
- ALWAYS follow-up with the Tribal leaders after a meeting, especially if you committed to send additional information or a contact
- Ensure Tribes are notified when deadlines occur for Farm Bill Programs Advance payments.
- Communication and building relationships and partnerships are critical
