

California Tribes

- California is home to 110 federally recognized tribes, many other tribal communities, and to one of the largest populations of Native Americans in the United States.
- Tribal lands are found across all of California can vary considerably by size and natural resource concerns. Many face challenges due to their remote location, lack of water for irrigation or soils that are unsuitable for conventional agriculture.
- Resource concerns include forest and rangeland health, access to culturally important plants, creating suitable subsistence food production and supporting habitat for various animal species.



- Farm visit and soil health training.




