Review of State Laws that Affect Agriculture

All TSPs should be familiar with the State of Vermont's Agency of Agriculture's "Required Agricultural Practices".

Vermont's Agency of Agriculture requires that "Large Farm Operations", "Medium Farm Operations", and "Certified Small Farm Operations" must have <u>nutrient management plans</u> completed by a certified nutrient management planner or the permittee.



Review of State Laws that Affect Forestry

All Forestry TSPs must be licensed with the **State of Vermont**.

All Forestry TSPs should be familiar with: <u>Timber Harvesting in Vermont – Summary of Laws and Regulations</u>

All Forestry TSPs should be familiar with: <u>Acceptable Management Practices for Maintaining Water Quality on Logging Jobs in Vermont (AMP's)</u>

All Forestry TSPs should be familiar with the State of Vermont's "Use Value Appraisal" (UVA) or "current use" program which has helped conserve Vermont's working lands – lands taxed on forestry value, not development value



Review of Important Resource Issues

VT's Agency of Natural Resources maintains a list of "Threatened and Endangered Species".

VT's Agency of Agriculture regulates water resources.



Review of Major Land Uses

Vermont is roughly 70-75% forestland (~4.6 million acres) and 10% cropland (~1.9 million acres). About 20% of the cropland acres are managed for hay.

Water quality is a major resource concern in VT.

Vermont has placed much emphasis on improving water quality in the Lake Champlain, Connecticut River, <u>Lake Memphremagog</u> watersheds.



Lake Champlain—The 6th "Great Lake"


- Lake is over 120 miles long
- Within Vermont, New York, and the Province of Quebec
- 6th largest freshwater lake in U.S.
- Total basin area = 8,234 sq. miles,
- 56% of the Basin lies in Vermont,
- 2,951,065 Acres in Vermont
- 48% of VT Acres are in the 'Basin'





Connecticut River Watershed

- Connecticut River is the longest river in New England (400 miles long).
- Forms the border between VT and NH.
- 11,260 square mile watershed encompasses parts of five states and the Province of Quebec.
- The river is fed by 148 tributaries including 38 major rivers along its path.
- Home to over 2.4 million people.
- VT has invested over \$60 million since 2016 in water quality related work.





Review of Major Land Ownership

Vermont's population is approximately 645,000 (2021).

Approximately 70-75% of Vermont's land cover is forest.

Approximately 80% of VT's forests are privately owned.

VT is the largest producer of maple syrup in the US ($^{\sim}$ 2.5 million gallons.

Dairy farming and forestry are still important economic drivers.



Expected TSP Workflow

- The State Resource Conservationist (SRC) will be responsible for reviewing TSP conservation planning for the National Planner Designation.
- Subsequent conservation plans will be reviewed by the District Conservationist (DC) at the local USDA Service Center.
- The SRC will conduct plan reviews for TSP planner designation renewals.
- TSPs will work with the local District Conservationist to make sure the proper environmental evaluations (NRCS.CPA.52) are completed.
