Report on 2023 Local (Franklin County) EQIP Funding Pools (we are now limited in what we can have for fund pools - can only choose from Ag Waste, Forestry, Pasture, Cropland, High Tunnel, Wildlife, and new in 2022 a "unique local priority") The new applications are a 3 part application.

- Animal Waste 50% Of the 6 applications 2 were funded
- Forestry 44% Of the 18 applications 4 were funded and included Invasive Species
- Pasture 3% Of the 2 applications 2 were funded
- Cropland (including hayland) 3% Of the 5 applications 1 was funded No changes were madeat this time to the percentages.
- Should we include a "unique local priority" for 2024? At this time, it was determined that unique funding was not needed to be determined specifically. High tunneles that needed advance funding are done so with (EQUIP) and there is a State fund pool for these tunnels through the Agriculture Assistance Program.
