

Public/Private Lands in Nevada




Overview



Inflation Reduction Act

Provides an additional \$47 million to Nevada

- Climate smart mitigation categories
 - Soil Health
 - Nitrogen Management
 - Livestock Partnership
 - Grazing and Pasture
 - Agroforestry, Forestry and Wildlife habitat
 - Restoration of Disturbed Lands
 - Energy, Combustion and Electricity Efficiency



Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP)

- Helps producers implement practices and activities that can lead to cleaner water and air, healthier soil and better wildlife habitat, and improved agricultural operations.
- Can be used for replacement of existing range improvements



EQIP on Public Lands

Regular application process applies

- A grazing permit from the BLM or Forest Service satisfies the "Effective Control" provision
- Can be used for replacement of existing range improvements

EQIP Eligibility and Payments

- Three parts
 - Applicant eligibility
 - Land eligibility
 - Resource concern eligibility
- Payments limited to \$450,000 for life of 2018 Farm Bill
- Historically underserved producers, including tribal members, may be eligible for increased payment rates or advance payments

Control of the Land

- To document 'Control' or 'Effective Control' of the public land, ALL the following conditions must be met and supporting documents provided by applicant:
 - Grazing Permit and/or lease with a clearly identified grazing term covering the entire contract period.
 - Documentation identifying all permittees on a given allotment
 - Landowner Concurrence Form, email message, or letter from the appropriate signee which lists the activities to be planned and stated concurrence of those activities.
 - Signees can be BLM Field Managers or US Forest Service District Rangers

Typical Conservation Practices on Public Land

- 314- Brush management (Pinyon/Juniper Removal etc)
- 315- Herbaceous Weed Treatment
- 382- Fence
- 516- Livestock pipeline
- 528- Prescribed Grazing
- 533- Pumping plant (solar pump etc)
- 550- Range planting
- 574- Spring development
- 614- Watering facility (water troughs, storage tank)
- 642- Water well (livestock well)
- 649- Structure for wildlife (fence markers, escape ramps in troughs, etc)

Fire Related Practices

- Can be used to improve resiliency and protect against the threat from wildland fires
- Can be used on public or private lands
- Same eligibility criteria applies (needs to be ag producer, etc.)
- Can be applied through EQIP

- 315 Herbaceous Weed Treatment
- 338 Prescribed burning
- 383 Fuel Break
- 384 Woody Residue Treatment
- 394 Firebreak
- 528 Prescribed Grazing
- 560- Access Road
- 666 Forest Stand Improvement
