Meeting Notes:

- 1. State Conservationist Report (Josh Odekirk, josh.odekirk@usda.gov)
 - a. Staffing
 - i. Wisconsin will be posting for State Conservationist (was hoping for beginning of January)
 - ii. Will be coordinated with the hiring of the State Conservationists in Louisianna and Oregon
 - iii. Phil Rivera is on yearlong detail, so Betsy is acting ASTC-M&S for Phil
 - iv. Jae Sutherland is acting Betsy
 - v. Eric Allness is now State Conservationist for Kentucky, Ryan Gerlich acting ASTC Partnerships until Eric's position is filled.
 - vi. Chris Borland is back from detail and will resume his position as Tribal Liaison, so Brian Briski will resume his position
 - vii. Currently, WI NRCS has approximately 315 FTE's
 - 1. We are at capacity for most offices
 - 2. We need to continue to staff up in the field offices to accommodate additional work from IRA funds
 - 3. Still under Continuous Resolution (CR) up to early March, so need to "frugal" with spending.
 - b. Farm Bill
 - i. Still in the works and should be approved in the next couple of months
 - c. Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) Funds Update
 - i. EQIP and CSP Funds that were provided exceeded the amount we were expecting (unprecedented amounts)
 - ii. Focus on Climate Smart related activities

- iii. All funds need to be spent in FY24
- iv. We are expecting the same amount of additional funds over the next three years.
- v. There will be no change in contract caps for EQIP
- 2. Watershed & Flood Prevention Program (Adam Dowling, <u>adam.dowling@usda.gov</u>)
 - a. New role to help Steve Becker and his Engineering team
 - b. Watershed & Flood Prevention Operations (WPFO)
 - i. Decommissioned flood control acts from 1944 & 1954
 - c. These are not NRCS led (request comes from the local sponsor)





- d. Program steps take 5-7 years to complete
- e. Funding started for the program in 2017
- f. Koshkonong Creek Watershed
 - i. Stretches have been straitened over the years leading to increased sediment
 - ii. If approved, the request moves to Preliminary Investigation Feasibility Report (PIFR)
- g. Black Earth Creek Watershed
 - i. 2008 flood had huge impact on watershed
 - ii. Sponsored by Dane County
- h. Bear Creek Watershed
 - i. Requires local sponsor
 - ii. Involves many different entities and policies
 - iii. Steve Becker conducted analysis
- i. Root River Watershed
 - i. Just beginning the planning process
- j. Coon Creek Watershed
 - i. Holding public meeting led by Steve Becker
 - ii. 12 dams constructed in early 1960's, 9 are being recommended for decommissioning
- 3. Easements Update (Dave Gundlach, <u>david.gundlach@usda.gov</u>)
 - a. Fund pool is nationally ranked
 - b. Worked with American Farmland Trusts
 - c. Focus was on depressional wetlands surrounded by damaged grasslands
 - d. Currently there is a holding pattern with state level funding
 - e. WRE was created as the terms don't match RCPP terms
- 4. Grazing Grasslands 2.0 (Adam Abel, <u>adam.abel@usda.gov</u>; Alex Steussy-Williams, <u>alex.steussywilliams@wisc.edu</u>)
 - a. Provides structure for grazing training
 - b. Consulted and discussed objectives with all potential partners (farmers, landowners, NRCS, UW, etc.)

 - FSA received authorization to accept offers for Continuous Signup 61 starting January 12th. This includes SAFE, HELI, and CREP. Given the 27 million acreage cap from the 2018 Farm Bill, non-CREP offers will be accepted via a batching process to ensure we do not exceed our acreage limit. The first batch will close on March 15th. Conservation Planning will not occur until the County Office has been notified of batch acceptance.
- v. All offers containing re-enrolled acreage much be submitted by July 31st.

Watershed & Flood Prevention Operations (WPFO) Program Project Updates

WFPO includes

- 1. Flood Prevention Operations Program (Flood Control Act 1944)
- 2. Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Act of 1954
- Goal: To provide technical & financial assistance to address resource concerns due to erosion, floodwater, & sediment & to provide for improved utilization of the land and water sources
- Program Requirements
 - 1. Watershed is less than 250,000 acres
 - 2. Watershed must have at least 20 percent agriculture land
 - 3. Requires a local sponsor to plan and implement the project.

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Securing letters of support from drainage districts

- Preparing questions for landowner interviews to ascertain issues and interest
- Group meeting to gauge support for pump stations and drainage water management
- If feedback is positive, move to Preliminary Investigation Feasibility Report (PIFR) (brief water resources study using existing data and field information to determine the feasibility of developing a project plan)



Black Earth Creek Watershed 👌 👌 🎸

Currently evaluating the feasibility of off-channel storage (OCS) volumes computed by USACE for flood mitigation

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- Once evaluation is complete, meet with Black Earth Creek Steering Committee
- If OCS is feasible and acceptable, secure letter of support to pursue a PIFR



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Bear Creek Watershed

- Meet with the Outagamie County officials and present the findings of tour, preliminary purpose & need for planning, and potential alternatives.
- If Sponsor concurs with WFPO Program assistance, assist Sponsors in submitting a formal letter requesting a PIFR.

Environmental Impacts: Grazing vs Confinement

- 24% less sediment loss
- 22% less sediment-bound P runoff
- 23% less soluble P runoff
- 27% lower volatilization of ammonia
- 14% lower net emission of greenhouse gases
- 25% smaller carbon footprint
