FY 2023 Conservation... By the Numbers

The Tennessee Department of Agriculture provided **\$11.3 million** from the Agricultural Resources Conservation Fund for installation of Best Management Practices.

NRCS provided technical assistance in planning, engineering, or agronomic design and layout, and inspection of **2,205** Best Management Practices, which stabilized **106,000** acres.

- 114,188 conservation practices planned, 57,031 implemented 2,307 conservation plans written on 402,162 acres
- 4,414 conservation plans applied on 724,805 acres
- 120,103 acres of practices applied to improve environmental quality in the Conservation Technical Assistance program
- Obligated \$7.5 million in 205 contracts on 94,777 acres in cover crops
- 42.3 percent of Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) funding and 15 percent of Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP) funding obligated to contracts with beginning farmers
- **54 percent** of EQIP funding totaling **\$22.7 million** obligated to **653** contracts with historically underserved customers
- 39 contracts in 53 Strikeforce counties in Tennessee totaling \$2.4 million on 2,366 acres
- Funded 74 contracts on 7,121 acres totaling \$3.8 million through the EQIP Landscape Conservation Initiatives
- Expended \$2 million in Emergency Watershed Protection Program funds for erosion control and debris removal caused by flooding
- Closed 6 Agricultural Conservation
 Easement Program-Wetland Reserve
 Easements easements totaling \$4.8
 million on 1,461 acres

NRCS Tennessee greatly appreciates our partnerships with the 95 Soil and Water Conservation Districts in Tennessee, which includes Tennessee's Association of Conservation Districts, Department of Agriculture, Conservation District Employees Association, Resource Conservation and Development Councils, and many others. Without them, we would not be able to reach our farmers and landowners to implement conservation systems through our voluntary programs on private lands in the state.

FY 23 Accomplishments

NRCS Tennessee continues to move the agency mission forward through voluntary Farm Bill conservation programs. Our employees and district partners and others have done a tremendous job with the delivery and implementation of our conservation efforts to producers in Tennessee.

In FY 2023, NRCS Tennessee:

- Processed 4,507 payments to Tennessee producers in the amount of \$38,510,342.
- Led the southeast region on applied acres reported to improve soil quality on 130,000 acres through the EQIP.
- Obligated \$2.2 million in seasonal high tunnels for 175 contracts.
- · Completed 100 percent monitoring on 375 easements.
- 16.0 percent of EQIP funding went to socially disadvantaged producers.
- Exceeded the national target of 50 percent of livestock and 10 percent of wildlife. Tennessee achieved 57 percent for livestock and 17 percent for wildlife.
- Received a total of 14 proposals for competitive funded agreements in FY2023 in the categories
 of conservation, urban conservation, and easement restoration. Of the 14 proposals received,
 eight proposals were selected for a total funding more than \$4.2 million.
- Tennessee graduated five employees in the second class of the Louisiana, Mississippi, and Tennessee Southeast Leadership Development Program. This program provides a unique developmental opportunity to prepare NRCS employees for positions of greater responsibility.
- Tennessee hosted 22 student interns in three different programs.
- Obligated \$5.3 million in CSP and \$3.4 million in EQIP Inflation Reduction Act financial assistance.

FY23 Program Highlights

Approximately **\$65 million** was obligated in Farm Bill funding and **\$20 million** in technical assistance to help Tennessee land users, units of local and state government, communities, and other federal agencies with planning and implementing conservation systems.

Who We Are...What We Do

Simply put—NRCS in Tennessee helps American farmers make conservation work for them through its science-based conservation planning and implementation. The system of practices we promote helps farmers improve production, reduce input costs, and conserve natural resources for the future. We also provide financial resources to help with the costs involved with getting conservation on the ground and improving soil health, water and air quality, and other natural resource benefits.

As of December 2023, there were 237 NRCS employees working in Tennessee throughout 72 USDA Service Centers in the state along with four area offices and the Nashville state office. In FY 2023, NRCS partnerships included 42 active contribution, cooperative, and grant agreements totaling \$21.8 million that supported 99 field positions.

Our Earth Team volunteers are instrumental in helping us put conservation on the ground with volunteers donating hundreds of hours of their time to help Tennessee NRCS in its volunteer efforts and meet its mission of helping people help the land. These dedicated volunteers work with our conservation partners on private lands to improve soil quality, conserve water, improve air quality, and enhance wildlife habitat.

NRCS is helping to ensure the health of our natural resources and the long-term sustainability of American agriculture. Our Conservation Technical Assistance program is the foundation of our financial and technical assistance delivery system. It provides land users with proven conservation technology needed to achieve the benefits of a healthy and productive landscape. According to numerous agricultural resources, Tennessee has roughly 26 million acres of land, of which 89 percent is privately owned. Furthermore, 11 million acres — or 42 percent — are farmlands.





About Our Programs...





Environmental Quality Incentives Program offers financial and technical assistance to eligible producers to help install or implement conservation practices on eligible agricultural land.

Air



Conservation Stewardship Program helps agricultural producers maintain and improve their existing conservation systems and adopt additional conservation activities to address priority resource concerns.

Plants



Agricultural Conservation Easement Program This program provides financial and technical assistance to help conserve agricultural lands and wetlands and their related benefits. This program contains an Agricultural Land Easements and a Wetlands Reserve Easements component.



Regional Conservation Partnership Program is merit-based and targets specific vulnerable areas and is administered through partnership agreements and through program contracts or easement agreements.
