Forest Farming (379)

Cultivation of non-timber forest products (NTFP's) under a managed tree canopy

Purposes

Improve soil health with organic matter Carbon capture and storage Increase terrestrial habitat Crop and income diversity Cultural preservation



Alley Cropping (311)

The cultivation of herbaceous crops in the alleys between rows of trees or shrubs

Purposes

Reduce surface water runoff and erosion Enhance microclimate for crop/forage quality and quantity Increase carbon storage Enhance wildlife and beneficial insect habitat Increase crop diversity Improve soil health



Silvopasture (381)

The deliberate integration of trees and grazing livestock operations on the same land

Purposes

Provide forage, shade, and/or shelter for livestock Improve water and soil quality Reduce erosion Enhance habitat for wildlife and pollinators Increase carbon sequestration and storage



Goal 1 - Forest Farming

Enhance forestland conservation by increasing the adoption of sustainable and profitable forest farming (379) practices in the forest understory as financial incentive.



Goal 2 - Alley Cropping

Explore Alley Cropping (311) with medicinal herbs and shrubs as an economically viable conservation practice with market-based incentives for adoption.



Forest Farming Calculator - Botanicals

Introduction

The Forest Farming Calculator - Botanicals is an Excel-based tool that can provide general estimates of income potential from wild stewarding and/or forest farming understory woodland plants for botantical markets. This scoping tool provides preliminary estimates based on default budgets and a more detailed budget based on your specific situation and parameters will be necessary to assess the economics for your enterprise. With support from a USDA NRCS National Conservation Innovation Grant, this tool was developed through wide network of partners and feedback from numerous producers.



Practice Standard Approval



- Barriers & Solutions: limited awareness & technical capacity for agroforestry practices
 - Cross training and mentorship
 - Demonstration sites
 - Farm tours & case studies
- Assisted VA & WV NRCS with adoption, including:
 - 379 payment schedule
 - 379 & 311 agroforestry PEG
 - 379 site visit evaluation guide
 - 379 joint site visits
- In 2023, IRA provided \$19.5 billion to USDA NRCS over 5 years to support programs that yield climate change mitigation benefits (i.e. agroforestry)
