Lake to Lagoon

Regional Conservation Partnership Program Alachua Conservation Trust

Project Overview

The Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) is partnering with Alachua Conservation Trust through the Regional Conservation Partnership Program (RCPP) to implement the "Lake to Lagoon" project. The project helps Florida landowners in the project area apply conservation practices that improve these areas for people and wildlife.

Alachua Conservation Trust (ACT) together with NRCS and 13 partners will implement land management and conservation easement activities to protect and conserve a low-lying region in East Central Florida bounded by large lakes and rivers facing climate-induced changes like increased sea level rise, storm intensity, droughts, and wildfire. Lake to Lagoon RCPP accelerates land protection and land management to protect environmentally sensitive and working lands and benefit regional climate mitigation.

Goal

Protection of over 12,000 acres of land will complement existing conservation plans for protection of environmentally sensitive lands and areas of Wildlife Corridor.

Primary Resource Concerns

Primary conservation benefits include long term protection of land, degraded plant condition, field sediment, nutrient and pathogen loss, fire management, terrestrial habitat, and weather resilience.

Objectives

Lake to Lagoon has two major impacts for Florida's sensitive land areas.

- Lake to Lagoon will focus will be building on existing state and county programs to leverage federal funding to address resource
- Accelerate efforts to protect farms, ranches, and timberlands, which provide valuable ecosystem service3s and sustainable natural lands to improve natural resources and benefit climate resiliency.



Conservation Practices

- Prescribed buring
- Brush management
- Tree planting
- Prescribed grazing
- Forest stand improvement
- Irrigation water management
- Well decommissioning
- Nutrient management
- Pasture and hay planting

Other practices may be added at teh

discretion of NRCS and the lead partner based on targeted resource concerns and land uses.

By leveraging collective resources and collaborating on common goals, RCPP demonstrates the power of publicprivate partnerships in delivering results for agriculture and conservation.

Through the **RCPP Program,** NRCS provides financial and technical assistance to farmers and ranchers to plan and implement conservation practices on agricultural land and non-industrial private forest land.
