Conservation practices to reduce nutrient loss and improve water quality

What is RCPP?

The Regional Conservation Partnership Program (RCPP) promotes coordination of NRCS conservation activities with partners that offer value-added contributions to expand our collective ability to address on-farm, watershed, and regional natural resource concerns. Through RCPP, NRCS seeks to co-invest with partners to implement projects that demonstrate innovative solutions to conservation challenges and provide measurable improvements and outcomes tied to the resource concerns they seek to address.

Project

The Iowa Natural Heritage Foundation will address key conservation concerns to restore 10,000 acres and recover 8,000 acres of conservation easements on vital grasslands across 40 counties in western and southern Iowa, focusing on the Loess Hills Landform. The Department of Natural Resources will use predictive models to assess environmental impacts and estimate effects on grazing and forage production.

Eligible Practices

The project establishes an approach for private sector conservation planning support for practices such as:

- Brush Management
- Conservation Cover
- Cover Crops
- Firebreaks
- Herbacious Weed Control
- Prescribed Buring
- Prescribed Grazing
- Restoration of Rare and Declining Natural Communities
- Wildlife Habitat Management
- Woody Residue Treatment
